Today, we take home with us the tangible tribute to twenty-four of our brave men who gave their lives during our operations in Afghanistan.

Let us all be silent to honour their memory, and the memory of all the other men and women of the coalition forces who fell in Afghanistan.

Ladies and gentlemen,

With this ceremony we salute the extraordinary determination of the men we lost: the determination to be of service.

To their nation.

To their Allies.

To their comrades.

It was these comrades who took the initiative to have this memorial erected.

Warrant Officer Rien van Duren of the Task Force Uruzgan was deployed twice in this Afghan province. During that time, soldiers fell, some were killed in action.

After their repatriation to Holland,
Rien and his colleagues felt a painful
void.

Although they would never forget their comrades, they felt the need for something tangible.

A monument.

In the heart of Camp Holland.

To remember.

To honour.

To mourn.

To warn.

This monument embodies all of these feelings.

- The iron sheet is rough, like
 Afghanistan.
- The nameplates of the fallen hover over the surface, as they fell in a country far away from home.

- The monument is open to the elements. The rain leaves traces of rust, resembling the tears that we shed for these men.
- The foundation is strong and robust, just like the unit they belonged to.

Today, we take this monument home with us.

It will be included in the Afghanistan exhibition of our Defence Museum in Delft awaiting its final destination.

This monument will be treated with respect and honour.

The same way that we treat the memory of these fine men.
