Does it also mean that applicants who already received either MDG3 or FLOW1 funding are not eligible to apply?	1.	This statement applies to all areas. Specific activities that are already been funded by the Ministry cannot be rewarded twice.  No, the statement does not refer to organizations, but to specific activities of those organizations that are already receiving funds from the Ministry.
2	16/6/2015	With regards the FLOW policy framework, I hereby would like to inquire about the following:  Chapter 4 A civil society organization is only eligible for one FLOW 2016-2020 grant, either as lead party or as coapplicant. A civil society organization can be a coapplicant in an alliance only if it is not the lead party of another alliance or independently applying.  1. Question: Does the above imply that coapplicants in practice can join in multiple applications?  Chapter 7 The category of countries where the program can be implemented is not entirely clear. For example D8 and D11 provide different formulations:  D.8: The program concerns activities of substance in at least one low- and lower-middle income country.  D.11: The activities for which grant funding is sought are implemented in low- or lower-middle income countries, and/or in China, Malaysia, Thailand, Jordan, Algeria, Iran, Lebanon, Libya and Tunisia.  2. Question: Is D.8 a wrong formulation? Are LDCs part of the lower income countries?	2.	Yes, that is possible, but only as co-applicant; please note that organizations can be granted just one FLOW grant.  All activities for which a grant is requested should be implemented in low income countries or lower-middle income countries and/or in China, Malaysia, Thailand, Jordan, Algeria, Iran, Lebanon, Libya and Tunisia (D.11). In addition to this, each program should concern activities in at least one low income country and one low-middle income country (D.8). However it needs to be clear which costs fall under overhead and how these are being calculated. Also, overhead costs need to be reasonable as compared to program costs.
